Independent Music Teachers Forum

I appreciate having this space to share my thoughts with you and have given a fair amount of time to thinking about the role of the Independent Music Teacher in our society. This year, I asked everyone to look at our code of ethics. In particular, to see if the ethical questions that come up in organizations are adequately dealt with by the professional organization that represents us. Part of my job description includes issuing a questionnaire every 2 years. Considering the usual lack of participation, I had serious questions about doing so. However, after reading the article in the latest AMT magazine, I have reconsidered. So, you will ALL be asked to fill one out soon.

This brings me to the point of this article: Independent Music Teachers - this is your column! My soapbox is that you are highly trained, highly skilled, underpaid, overworked, and - all too often - have a self image that doesn't include the word 'professional'. Certainly, in the broader society, our image is one that does NOT reflect the professional image I have of myself. I keep looking for a piano teacher to be portrayed as competent, caring, educated, running a business, etc. In short, a person with a real profession! If we are satisfied with the status of our work, then so be it. However, if not, then let's work together to upgrade ourselves and our image. Begin by responding to the questionnaire, and then - any issues you would like discussed have a place in this column. ARIZONA STUDY PROGRAM

The ASP committee met on September 24, 2005, and welcomed two new members, Joy Baber and Elaine Dyches. The complete committee roster is listed on the ASMTA website.

Please check the ASMTA website for ASP information and updates. Committee decisions will be posted after being approved by the ASMTA board. The ASP committee meets in September and March.

Program forms for Levels 9-12 are due January 15. If a student enrolls later, the program form is due at the time of enrollment. Program forms for Levels 5-8 and all late enrollments are due by March 1. Program forms are not required for Levels 1-4.

The following optional repertoire ideas are being piloted this year:

- 1. Advanced students, levels 9-12, may replace ONE of their usual repertoire pieces with a *memorized* group of pieces (minimum of 3) from a larger work by a composer. Pieces should be chosen with a variety of tempo, meter, texture, etc., within the chosen opus. The length must also be considered to remain within the evaluation time limit. The **required** list is on the website or you may get it from your local chairman.
- 2. Level 11-12 students may choose a Bach Prelude and Fugue listed in an earlier level. The complete P & F will count as their Baroque piece at their level.

Please remember that a <u>complete</u> piece or movement of a sonata or sonatina must be performed. The exposition alone does not meet the requirements. Also, though teachers may teach technique differently, the required technique skills listed for the student's level must be prepared and ready for performance.

The ASP committee decided, with ASMTA Board approval, to return to Dr. Anthony's original intent that students continue their study throughout high school. Only students who have successfully completed level 12A in their senior year will be eligible for the James Anthony Senior Award. As in previous years, the Bullock Scholarship will continue to be awarded only to students who have received the Anthony Award.

The new vocal program has been launched! Thank you, Joy Baber and your committee, for your high level of dedication and enthusiasm in making this program possible. Twelve students are enrolled in the pilot program so far. Feedback from teachers and students is vital. Please email your comments and suggestions to Joy.

I wish all of you a Happy New Year. May 2006 bring you rewarding personal lives, challenging studios and musical responsibilities, and many precious memories.
