

89th Annual Conference "Russian Seasons in Arizona"

May 31-June 2, 2018, DoubleTree Resort by Hilton Paradise Valley-Scottsdale

Let's move back to the last century. So many new names of musicians, poets and painters that century discovered for all of us around the world. So many great performers of different arts which we still remember and admire by their incredible interpretation whether it's music, dance, etc.

What are Russian Seasons? "Russian Seasons" were performances of Russian artists of opera and ballet which were held outside Russia. Russian seasons were established by Sergei Diaghilev. He was born to a wealthy and cultured family on March 31, 1872 in Selishchi (Novgorod Governorate), Russia. He spent his childhood in Perm (European part of Russia near the Ural Mountains) and after graduating from Perm gymnasium in 1890, he went to the capital (St. Petersburg at that time) to study law at St. Petersburg University. At the same time he was also taking classes at the St. Petersburg Conservatory of Music where he studied singing and music, a love of which he had picked up from his stepmother. After graduating in 1896, he abandoned his dreams of composition, his professor, Nikolai Rimsky–Korsakov, telling him that "he had no talent for music." So he chose a different path to express his passion and love for music. He stated "It seems to me I found the true meaning of my life, it's philanthropy".



Russian Seasons were a unique phenomenon of Diaghilev's talent as impresario. He loved the arts and tried to share his passion of music, ballet and painting with the world. He introduced many new names to the world culture through his Seasons. His Russian Seasons lasted until he died in 1929 in Venice, Italy.

For a year he travelled widely through Russia discovering many previously unknown masterpieces of Russian portrait art. In 1905, he organized a huge exhibition of Russian portrait painting at the Tauride Palace in St. Petersburg, including works by these formerly unknown artists he had discovered. Among the exhibitions were works by contemporary artists such as Alexandre Benois, Nicolai Rerikh, and Mikhail Vrubel. In the following year he took this major exhibition of Russian art to the Petit Palais in Paris. It was the beginning of a long involvement with France. Due to the popularity of this exhibition, it was also presented in Berlin, Monte-Carlo, and Venice. In 1907, he presented five symphony concerts of Russian music in Paris introducing Russian music treasures from Glinka to Scriabin. Rachmaninoff, Glazunov, Rimsky-Korsakov conducted their own works. And in 1908, Sergei Diaghilev mounted a production of Mussorgsky's Boris Godunov, starring Feodor Chaliapin, at the Paris Opéra. It was a huge success and it was the beginning of Russian Seasons. This led to an invitation to return the following year with ballet as well as opera, and thus to the launching of his famous Ballets Russes. The company included the best young Russian dancers, among them Anna Pavlova, Adolph Bolm, Vaslav Nijinsky, Tamara Karsavina and Vera Karalli, and their first night on May 19, 1909 was a sensation.

We get our inspiration from this remarkable cultural phenomenon known as Sergei Diaghilev and devote our upcoming State Conference to the Russian Seasons theme. Following Mr. Diaghilev's example, our focus will include discovering famous, new, and forgotten Russian composers and performers, uncovering new aspects of old masterpieces and successful pedagogic methods developed in Russia.

MTNA Certification Program

Do you have questions regarding Certification Renewal?

Go to the MTNA website, under Certification Renewal:

- 1. Candidates for Renewal of MTNA Permanent Professional Certification are not required to validate renewal points, activities or verification. However, a renewal fee is required.
- 2. Candidates for Renewal with Administrative Verification must verify that he or she has met the requirements for fulfilling the following official MTNA Professional Certifications Standards. A renewal fee is required.
- 3. Candidates for Renewal with documentation of Professional Activities Points must complete Standard IV and Standard V. A renewal fee is required.

Here are the dues amounts for certification renewal:

MTNA Member Non-Member \$30 per area Renewal Fee (Before July 1 each year). \$25 per area Renewal Fee (July 1 and after each year). \$30 per area \$40 per area


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
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
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UPCOMING EVENTS ASMTA COMPETITIONS
