Dear ASMTA Members,

The conference will present a broad range of topics related to both tradition and innovation in music education, pedagogy and performance and promises to be enlightening and inspiring.

If you have not yet logged into your Member Access (Dashboard) on the www.ASMTA.org website, I urge you to do so. At the very least, you should input your address on the *Find-A-Teacher* page and make sure your listing comes up as it should.

When the website was upgraded in 2017, we used the name, address and email addresses provided to us by MTNA at that time. I know of a few Members who have since changed email addresses and/or changed their last names (e.g. been married). We do our best to keep the ASMTA Membership Directory and Find-A-Teacher information synchronized with that of MTNA, but the process is manual, not automatic. As such, mistakes can happen. In an effort to make sure all of you are able to log into the ASMTA Member Dashboard to obtain the Membership Directory and other ASMTA resources (e.g. ASP Technique videos, Bylaws, Constitution, policies and procedures, ASP Online Store, and modify your Member Profile as referenced above), I will be offering two training opportunities:

- Interactive training webinar, in mid-March; and
- In-person training/presentation at the ASMTA State Conference on Thursday, June 6, 2019.

So, watch for an email soon, announcing the ASMTA Member Dashboard login training. It is my goal that all ASMTA be able to log into their ASMTA Member Dashboard. (Yes. This includes all of you who consider yourselves technology dinosaurs. You can do this!)

IMPORTANT NOTICE. If you wish to keep your listing on the ASMTA website (Membership Directory and Find-a-Teacher) from one year to the next, starting with Summer/Fall 2019, be sure to pay your MTNA/ASMTA dues (and, where, applicable, your local dues) on time. Remember, the membership year runs from July 1 through June 30th (October 1 through September 30th for collegiate members). Starting with the membership year 2019-2020, so long as you renew your dues anytime between April 1st and October 31st, you can keep your listing on the website. If you miss renewing your 2019-2020 dues by October 31, you will have to wait until the next year to be listed again.

Hi there, everyone!

Jared Immerman here with the latest installment of music tech news for Q1 2019. First off, I am really excited to be presenting at the ASMTA State Conference this June 6-8, 2019 in Flagstaff. I'm developing a unique workshop on photo and video, and will share more details with you as the time draws nearer.

In the meantime, let me share a new music product with you that is scheduled to release later this year. It was first showcased a few weeks ago at the NAMM Show, this past January 24-27, 2019. The NAMM Show is an annual music trade and tech show, attracting over 115,000 people and 2,200 vendors every year. The show has also brought in many well-known musicians in the past and present, including Richie Sambora, Carlos Santana, Stevie Wonder, and more. While I did not attend the event this year, I have been following along with the news of the best products featured, and am excited to share one of them here:

Casio Privia PX-S1000. This keyboard takes portability to a whole new level. Weighing in at just 25 lbs., and allowing portable power via 6 AA batteries (or a traditional wall adapter), this keyboard is a great compact option for traveling. It has a sleek, glossy black finish with an illuminated touch-sensitive panel for controlling all the sounds. It has the usual weighed hammer action of a digital piano, which I wasn't able to test, but those that did review the product seemed to like it. Another cool perk of the keyboard is that it can also function as a Bluetooth-speaker, meaning that it can connect to your phone, tablet, or computer, and play any audio from those devices through the keyboard's speakers. I'm hoping to demo the unit sometime once it releases. It seems like a great compact and budget keyboard. The Casio Privia PX-S1000 arrives in April 2019 for \$599. IMPORTANT INFORMATION

- 1. Information about the **monetary awards for the James Anthony award** was included in the summer 2018 and the *Fall 2018 MusiGRAM* articles as submitted by the ASP Chairman. Basically the award will be based on available funds. For this year, any high school senior completing and passing Level 12 at a Category A is entitled to the James Anthony award. The monetary award will be \$35 for each different level completed with a special award of \$500 for completing all 12 levels at Category A. Any other information regarding the Anthony award is superseded by the Musigram announcements.
- 2. **TECHNIQUE VIDEO!** This long awaited video of all the technique for Levels 1 through 12 is available on YouTube. The technique video project has been completed! Members can access the YouTube link via the ASMTA website <u>asmta.org\Arizona Study Program\</u>, General Information page.
- 3. The deadline for enrolling students in ASP for the 2019 evaluations is February 15, 2019 (late fee will apply). Registrations received after that time will not be accepted. Review the ASMTA website Arizona Study Program for additional information for each local association.
- 4. The deadline for submitting Student Program Forms to your local chairman is February 15 (TMTA is January 15 for Levels 9-12). Forms and information are available on the ASMTA website. Look for your local association in the Arizona Study Program pages.
- 5. ASP has two grant programs: Janice McCurnin Teacher Enrichment Grant Program and the Janice McCurnin Certification Grant Program both of which can provide monetary assistance to ASP teachers. The application deadline is March 1. See the <u>ASMTA website/Arizona Study Program for information and application forms</u>.
- 6. ASP Evaluations will begin in late April. Your chairman will be contacting you to volunteer. Please visit the website regarding volunteering information. ASP is a statewide program that only exists with the volunteer efforts of participating teachers. Thank you to all who participate

and support the Arizona Study Program.

ASP is entering its 61st year thanks to the volunteer efforts of its founders and supporting chairmen, committees, and especially the participating teachers and students!

Dean Elder



Dean Elder, B.A., M.A., ASMTA 2018 Honorary Life Member, pianist, teacher, writer, critic, and adjudicator passed away on Monday night, December 3, 2018. He was 98 years old. He was a great musician and an incredible person, very knowledgeable and at the same time very modest.



Dean had his early piano training with Franziska Heinrich. In his teen years, Elder won the Spokane Concerto Competition. Later, he studied with Walter Frey, Alfred Cortot, and Walter Gieseking in Europe at the Zurich, Paris, and Saarbrucken Conservatories. He was the Consulting Editor for Clavier Magazine and the author of Pianist at Play, a book of interviews with great pianists, master classes, and technical regimes. Dean had served on the juries of numerous competitions, including the 1997 Van Cliburn International Piano Competition.

In 1999 Dean and his wife Carolyn moved from Long Island, New York, where they were teaching for nearly 50 years, to Scottsdale, Arizona. Since then Dean has been involved in the musical life of the PMTA. He has served as a judge for PMTA competitions and ASP evaluations, given presentations at the general meetings, and made contributions to the Celebration of Music Competition for scholarship money (now known as the Dean and Carolyn Elder Competition).

Everyone who knew Dean was amazed how much he knew and he was always curious to hear new young musicians of all different levels. When he couldn't come to the competitions he was always asking to bring him programs from these competitions/festivals and he would always write a note to teachers to encourage and congratulate them.

Once, I brought 5 students who performed for him on Thanksgiving Day of 2017. He listened to them with great interest. On the next day he wrote in his email: "Is your pupil aware that this Rondo theme (Mozart's Rondo in D) comes at least in the Keys of D, b minor, a minor, A, G, d minor, F, and B flat? There may be more keys as I don't have the music in front of me". Later, my student and I checked the score and Dean was absolutely right, he had named all the keys!

I am very fortunate to have met Dean Elder and really enjoyed knowing such an incredible man. He will always be in my memory as "my friend beyond words, time, and distance."
