Dear ASMTA Members,

Since my last writing to you, our world has been turned upside down due to COVID-19. Schools were closed, nonessential businesses shuttered, and people were ordered to stay home to keep the general population safe and healthy. I know that I've had my emotional ups and downs throughout this time, but I've been grateful for an electronic connection to my family, friends, and colleagues. Learning how to teach online has been interesting, and I'm sure many of you have joined me in that venture – I even hosted my spring recital online! I truly hope that you're able to continue moving forward with your lives as much as possible, and that you're healthy, happy, and musical.

Because of this unfortunate turn of events, many of ASMTA's events for the spring and summer were canceled. Both the ASMTA Conference and Honors Recitals were called off, and the Arizona Study Program's evaluations were canceled for all but the Level 12A students (top level). RCM evaluations were postponed until June and July but are still occurring online instead of in person. I have been happy to see that several local events around the state were held online, and the ASMTA Board of Directors has also moved to meeting online in order to keep our organization moving forward.

One of our biggest messages to all our ASMTA members for the future is make contingencies. As a state organization, we are setting up the ASMTA Conference 2021, Honors Recital 2021, and MTNA Competitions 2020/2021 as I write this. In every instance, we are coming up with contingency plans in case things cannot be held in person. The ASMTA Board has even created a cancellation and refund policy. The MTNA Competitions will be online only this year, with registration via MTNA due by September 16th at 12pm MST. The ASMTA Conference is planned for May 27-29, 2021 at Arizona State University, with the Honors Recital occurring during that time frame. We hope all of this will happen as planned, but we are making contingencies in case the world has other plans. What contingencies can you put in place for your teaching?

Remember that MTNA has extended your 2019-2020 membership year until September 1st, so your ASMTA membership remains until that time as well. Don't forget to renew —being together makes us stronger in times of hardship.

Covid-19 caught all of us unaware!! Evaluations were cancelled for 2020 except for Level 12A students. This was an enormous undertaking but with a dedicated committee, 76 Level 12A students were evaluated on May 16, 2020, by eight of our highly respected ASP adjudicators. The performance part of the evaluations was done by submission of YouTube videos. The adjudicators commented and gave their ratings on specially prepared fillable Student Evaluation Forms. The theory testing was done by a specially prepared fillable test sent to students from ASP via their respective teachers. I could probably go on and on about the trials and tribulations, etc., but the telling could either make you anxious or bore you! However, it all happened and the comments from parents, teachers, adjudicators, and especially the students, made all the work so worthwhile. Thank you to Victoria MacDonald, David DeSoucey, Fran Kaspar, and especially to Barb Russell, Suszy Traylor and myself for all their input and hard work. None of this would have happened without Suszy's great knowledge of the internet, computers, and a world foreign to most of us!!! "Packet 3" which includes all student tests, evaluation forms, ribbons, trophies and Anthony awards have been

Enrollment fees paid for the 2019-2020 evaluation year were refunded to 229 teachers. A few teachers donated their refund to ASP at a total of \$140. Because of the process ASP has in place for awarding students the James Anthony Senior Award, Fran Kaspar has developed a system so that no student enrolled for 2020 will lose the year's work due to Covid-19 cancellations. We are generously counting this year as valid, without regard to category or level, if the student was enrolled. In addition, ASP wants our students to know that we appreciate their hard work and their desire to participate in the Arizona Study Program. Therefore, a certificate was made available to every student enrolled in the 2019-2020 evaluation year to acknowledge the

student's participation in preparing for the 2020 ASP evaluations. These blank certificates were made availa-

ble to all local ASP association chairman to distribute to those teachers in their association.

Because of Covid-19, we are all faced with so much uncertainty in the future. ASP is making plans to continue our wonderful program and we will keep everyone well informed. Please watch for our announcements.

Thank you to Jasmine Carlos and Robert Avril for their work on the ASP committee. They are resigning from their positions as of June 30, 2020. We welcome Jill Tabata to the ASP committee as our Ribbon, Trophy, and Plaque chairman. We welcome Dr. Andrew O'Brien to the ASP Committee serving as a co-chairman for EVMTA. In addition, another long time committee member, former ASP state chairmen, and local ASP/PMTA co-chairman, Carol Hill, NCTM, will be retiring from her position as local ASP/PMTA co-chairman. Carol has dedicated many, many hours to the Arizona Study Program. She first started as being the "student tester" of the program in her high school years with Janice McCurnin and Dr. Anthony as they were developing ASP!

It is with great sadness that I am announcing my retirement as Chairman, Arizona Study Program, effective June 30, 2020. It has been my honor to have served in this capacity for eight years. I was invited to the ASP committee in the early 1980's, serving with Janice McCurnin, Dr. James Anthony, and Gloria Ritt among others. My "New Normal" as an ASMTA Teacher:

How the Pandemic Changed How I Teach and Collaborate

My world changed on March 16. The few weeks prior, I had become acutely aware of the need to wash hands frequently, wipe down piano keys, querying students if I heard a sniffle or a cough.

My husband is one of the especially vulnerable popu-



lation if caught in the path of any virus. So, I was being extra careful. But when I heard the NBA was cancelling all their games for the rest of the season, and then the school districts were suspending classes for at least the next couple of

weeks, I knew this COVID-19 coronavirus was serious. No one had to tell me to cancel piano lessons (but I did) or to stay at home (but I was going to).

And so it went. Within a week, one by one, the AS-MTA conference cancelled, the MTNA conference cancelled, the Arizona Study Program cancelled (except for Level 12A students, that is), the PMTA annual luncheon cancelled. Meeting after meeting, event after event, all cancelled.

Luck would have it that I had coincidentally upgraded my computer and internet speed only two weeks earlier. This allowed me to easily, and quickly, start webstreaming my piano lessons. With the help of PMTA colleague, Jennifer Foxx's many outstanding presentations on how to teach virtually, along with some last-minute YouTube research,and Zoom, I was up and running.

Not all of my students signed on right away to the new lesson format, but for those who did, all seemed happy to be able to continue with their lessons. I even dared to host my Spring Recital using Zoom, inviting students, parents, families and friends to collectively view the students' pre-recorded performances. I was worried that the quality of the sound might be compromised by the "live stream", so I chose to show recordings of their perfor-



mances. (I may be more daring next time.)

Along the way I had to make adjustments in my procedures and equipment. I quickly had to obtain duplicate books/ sheet music for

each student because the video did not allow me to see the students' music as I would have if I were sitting next to

them. Instead of handing each student their new "Weekly Assignment" page which I would print out at each lesson, instead, I had to remember to email their assignment pages at the end of the day. Although I could have easily just used my small Dell laptop with its built-in web camera and microphone, I found it much easier to see my student's hands using a larger monitor (which I coincidentally had leftover from my recent computer upgrade. Yay!)

Early on in this new adventure, I had tried using my LogiTech portable webcam/mic. But sometime in late May, my Dell laptop started disliking it and refused to play nicely with it. So, I am back to using my Dell laptop's webcam. Oh, if all these tech tools could just get along.

I did however, decide to splurge on buying a Yeti microphone. I am unsure yet if this is an improvement as I still have some testing to do (placement, settings and such).

In the meantime, all ASMTA, ASP and Piano Ensemble meetings were held using Zoom, looking like this (Arizona Study Program Committee meeting)...



It was so good to see and talk to everyone and share our stories of what we are all going through.

I have not yet returned to in-person lessons, but I do look forward to it. The one thing I miss the most in the live-stream lesson is duet playing. If any of you have figured out how to play duets with your students "adequately" via Internet, let me know.

All in all, virtual technology made my life as a piano teacher during this pandemic not only pleasantly tolerable, but an interesting adventure, too.
